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Introduction

- This study delves into the evolving role of lay members in Research Ethics
 Committees (RECs) in Thailand. As research becomes increasingly complex and interdisciplinary, the need for robust ethical oversight is paramount.
- Lay members, with their diverse perspectives and experiences, play a crucial role in ensuring the ethical conduct of research.
- This study documents the findings of a survey of lay members of Research Ethics Committees (REC). The survey was carried out between August and October 2024.

Aim / Approach / Methods

Aims: to find out about the range of contributions that lay members are able to provide on RECs, the backgrounds, contributions, and perspectives. This study sought to find out more about the recommendations and challenges in supporting the reviewing process.


Approach: The exact number of lay members of RECs across Thailand is unknown, however, this report was entirely anonymous with responses neither linked to an individual or REC. Some parts of questions has adapted by the Survey of Lay Members of Research Ethics Committees (RECs) (Simons, Wren, Buckland, 2009)

Method: Online questionnaire, with a combinations of closed and open questions. Descriptive statistic and content analysis were employed






Demographics of REC lay members (n=54)




Demographics of REC lay members (n=54)


















Additional experiences to incorporate into EC/IRB work






The perspectives that applied to EC/IRB work




Opinions / perspectives are fully utilized in reviewing process






Opinions about working environment at EC/IRB





Recommendations (1)

1. Need for Continuous Training and Development

"Regular training (annual or more frequent) is emphasized for staying updated on societal and technological changes"

"Training should include a variety of case studies, complex situations, and new knowledge"

Recommendations (2)

2. Improvement in Selection and Qualification Criteria

"Concerns about inappropriate selection of laypersons for ethics committees, such as favoring academic retirees rather than individuals aligned with international standards"

3.Lay members' Role in Ethics Committees

"Layperson should understand their duties, including considering potential risks in complex research, and work closely with expert committees"

Recommendations (3)

4. Enhancing Collaboration and Knowledge Exchange

"Platforms such as LINE groups, workshops, or regular meetings to exchange ideas and experiences are highly valued"

"Networking and knowledge-sharing sessions, both domestically and internationally, can foster better decision-making"

5. Focus on Informed Consent Processes

"More attention is needed on the process of obtaining informed consent, ensuring privacy, freedom, and understanding for volunteers"

Conclusion

- Lay members play an indispensable role in ensuring ethical research.
- Continuous support, innovative practices, and training will strengthen the role of lay members in Thai RECs.
- Final message: Enhancing lay members' effectiveness helps maintain the integrity of scientific research and the protection of participants.
