


Identifying problem

The same community groups then utilized the information from the community survey to establish and manage a day-care centre.

- ✓ The feasibility of close collaboration with local levels and grassroots communities for research, intervention development, and policy advocacy is clearly demonstrated by these case studies.
- ✓ The approaches highlighted offer transferable solutions applicable to pressing health issues across all municipalities.
- ✓ A vital next step is establishing a clear mechanism for coordinating communication between communities and local levels.
